

THE FOUR COMPONENTS OF ADOPTING TOGETHER

1. Training and Recruitment

- Specific recruitment of adopter (child specific recruitment)
- Adopter-led profiling events
- Enhanced therapeutic training for adopters

2. Team for the Child Meeting

- Team for the Child meeting prior to formal matching led by Clinical Psychologist
- Adopting Together Buddy Adoption UK Cymru


3. Therapeutic Transitions

 Therapeutic transition sessions through structured play – pre and post move to adoptive family

4. Psychological Consultation Meetings

 Three consultation meetings post placement for adopters with Clinical Psychologist

If there are no families available for the children referred to the project by the regional collaboratives, we will identify with regions, those children who would benefit from a child specific recruitment strategy. This will be unique in Wales and has been evidenced through research by Selwyn (2008) and Farmer (2010) to reduce the timescales in identifying families for more complex children

TEAM FOR THE CHILD MEETING

Purpose

Brings together a wealth of information from those who know the child best

Pre-preparation

The production of the <u>Trauma-Nurture</u> timeline providing a detailed and complete picture of the child and the Foster Carers experience of the child. The <u>Foster Carer transition</u> notes completed, assessing child's needs, triggers and routines

Meeting format

Led by Clinical Psychologist

Chaired by Adopting
Together VAA Manager

Crucial participants: Foster
carers, Social Workers,
Prospective Adopters and
Therapeutic Transitions
Social Worker

Outcomes

Psychological formulation undertaken and report outlining the key issues and approaches most helpful in undertaking the parenting task. To recommend therapeutic transition plan; to consider post adoption support needs.



THERAPEUTIC TRANSISTIONS

- Theraplay
- DDP
- Narrative Story Work
- Clinical supervision from Psychologist

Supporting transitions pre, during and post placement through structured therapeutic play

Foster carer and adopter are supported to work together to ensure that the child develops a coherent narrative about moving from one primary attachment figure to another

Primary goal – child needs the adults around them to provide the scaffolding to help them remain regulated during the move from one primary care giver to another

Worker will write a therapeutic story for the child



PSYCHOLOGICAL CONSULTATION MEETINGS

Supporting families post-placement through 3 follow up consultation meetings with a clinical psychologist, child care and adoption social worker. This will allow new parents to safely reflect on the actual lived experience of parenting their child. Difficulties are anticipated and normalised. Working on adopters strengths and identifying strategies to support them.

Consultation meetings may identify further therapeutic interventions

REFERRAL PROTOCOL


- Simple referral pathways
- Early discussions with ATS Service Manager, St David's as necessary
- > ATS referral signed by Senior Manager agreeing to enhanced fee
- Completion of referral form sent to ATS lead at St David's Children Society
- Referral acknowledged and reviewed within 5 working days
- Accepted referrals shared with Barnardo's Cymru
- Family-finding is concurrent with regions not sequential

Finding Families

- External & Internal profiling events
- > Team meetings
- ➤ All Service Practitioner meetings
- > Targeted Recruitment
- Child Specific Recruitment



PROFILING EVENTS June 18 – September 19



REFERRAL DATA (June 18 – September 19)

52 referrals (total of **76** children) have been received 29 children currently active

13 children matched/placed

70% boys

Average age 4 years 8 months
Oldest single child 7 years 4 months

Youngest is part of a sibling group of 3 brothers aged 2 years 7 months



AVERAGE TIMESCALES FOR CHILDREN REFERRED TO ATS

Time spent with Birth Family

Highest – 5 years 2 months

Lowest - 1 year 1 months

Average -3 years 2 months


Average time spent in Foster Care

Highest - 3 years

Lowest – 1 year

Average 1 year 9 months





LESSONS LEARNT

- Timely referrals to enable child-specific campaigns and family-finding
- Earlier referral criteria? Children referred on point of plan changing to Long Term Foster Care
- Require greater consent to undertake targeted recruitment in addition to Child Specific
- Post placement consultations may need to span longer than 1 year – adopter led
- Challenge to embed ATS into Policy & Practice for family finding. Referrals can be slow and sporadic

- Same Psychologist throughout to create continuity, trust and understanding of the family
- Transition Therapeutic Social Worker attending Team for the Child meeting to become part of the planning process going forward
- Use of 'pre meets'; reflect, pause and longer period of introductions for older children; contact with foster carers soon after placement with adopters



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
